



A New Practice for Lent

Dear friends,

When I was a kid, Lenten observance was, ironically, a status symbol. My Catholic friends got to have special lunches on Fridays. The Episcopalians, foreheads still smudged with ash, came to school with something of an edgy, ancient aura. Our Baptist and non-denominational classmates wondered if they even belonged to the same religion as the rest of us as we talked about what we were "giving up" for forty days. For Little Suzy, it was chocolate. Ella went with ice cream. Johnny always said he'd ditch cussing. (That one usually lasted until the next baseball practice; fastballs off the elbow can make anyone lose their religion.) I'm not really sure we gave the true meaning of the season much thought. Lent was an onagain, off-again fad—up there with yo-yos and low-rise jeans—and whatever we decided to sacrifice paled in comparison to what Jesus was preparing to do, anyway.

This Wednesday, March 5th, we will once again gather for a somber service, complete with the imposition of ashes. I don't begrudge anyone who chooses that evening to "give something up" for the season. After all, though we can't "match" Jesus's story, we can still practice discipline and remind ourselves that in all things we must rely on God. However, sometimes practicing discipline means *choosing to do something* instead of abstaining from something. For example, this time last year, sixteen people from all walks of life came together at First Presbyterian-Columbus to commit to a new skill: writing poetry. For eight weeks we gathered to study the craft, workshop each other's work, and remind ourselves of the connection between Divine creativity and our own. What I think most people learned is that writing poetry requires a lot of work! You have to find quiet time in your busy life to sit down with your thoughts. You have to draft and edit, draft and edit; then you edit some more. You have to be okay with vulnerability—with people reading your work but also with being honest with yourself. You know what, though? Committing to that hard work led to (and, I hope for those participants, continues to lead to) incredible conversations with God. Sometime before Christmas, the result of these writers' work will be available in an anthology, too, and I hope that reading will become a part of someone's devotional practice. Their faith in the process and their meticulous labor will lead to many more blessings for years to come.

So, what will you commit to this Lenten season? You don't have to write poetry. Instead, maybe you'll tend a vegetable garden. Maybe you'll read a new book of the Bible each week. Maybe you'll visit Loaves & Fishes more regularly, beyond our congregation's serving dates. Maybe each day you'll email another community servant just to say "thank you." Whatever it is, commit seriously to the labor that is creating the Kingdom of God on Earth because God knows it takes everyone. You can probably ditch that Reese's cup, too.

The Prayer Group meets every Wednesday in the Parlor. All are welcome to join us.





